



The system-wide implementation and collaboration has enabled continuous improvement and growth for all students.

The Butterfly Effect: They Do Better When They See Us

Black Women are often overlooked when researchers focus on leadership in K-12 settings, yet they have a positive impact on student success. In this workshop, we will review the preliminary findings of my doctoral dissertation regarding the lived experience of Black women transitioning from K-12 classroom roles to K-12 leadership roles. We will then highlight the importance of Black students seeing Black women educational leaders as a critical component of their educational success.

Protecting Students from Exploitation/Prevention of Domestic Minor Sex Trafficking Salon II

Sex trafficking entails serious consequences for minors, including long-lasting physical and psychological trauma, delayed educational attainment, involvement in the juvenile justice system, and possibly death. Early prevention and intervention has resulted in the best possible outcomes. Protecting students from exploitation efforts requires a collective approach. A proactive approach to addressing and preventing students is developing district policy and protocol that includes training and awareness for in-school personnel and outside organizations, associations, not-for-profits, faith-based groups, and governmental entities that respond to instances of exploitation.

Changing the Landscape of Leadership in Young Women

Ever find yourself being in shock by something someone said, and you didn't know how to respond? Why is this hard for us? Implicit bias, subtle racism, and microaggressions are all upheld in our schools, impacting the educational experience of Black girls. Dr. Nancy Dome, founder of Epoch Education, uses a "Compassionate Dialogue" protocol called "Recognize, Interrupt, Repair." Participants will learn how we've introduced it as a district-wide practice to shift perspectives and interrupt microaggressions directed toward Black girls.




